UMs Provide Anti-malaria Nets in Sierra Leone

(UMNS) — The people of the UMC have been providing nearly 400,000 insecticide-treated mosquito nets to people throughout the Bo District of southern Sierra Leone beginning Nov. 26. The UMC contributed \$2 million to the effort as part of a larger nationwide net distribution and integrated health campaign. The church's Imagine No Malaria team trained more than 3,700 local health workers to distribute the nets using the "Nets for Life" model. The volunteers are delivering the nets from home to home, working to instill a community-wide understanding of the protective value of nets and the right way to use and maintain them. Former Head of Mission Giving Program Dies at 68

(UMNS) - Rev. William T. Carter, 68, who led the designated mission-giving program of the UMC for 27 years, died Nov. 22 at a Little Rock hospital after a long illness. Carter, who retired in 2006, was known throughout the denomination for his leadership of the Advance, a fund development unit of the UM Board of Global Ministries. "William T. Carter left an indelible professional legacy at the board and in the annals of the UMC," said Thomas Kemper, the agency's chief executive. "Personally, Bill touched many hearts and souls in his years as pastor and as leader of the Advance."

Jan. 10 Deadline to Apply for 2011 Human Relations Day Grant

Ministries should target non-violent young offenders.

Jan. 10 is the deadline to apply for a Human Relations Day Grant from the UM General Board of Church & Society (GBCS). The grants are to support ministries that respond to non-violent young offenders through education, advocacy or leadership training and development. Grant funds are raised through the UMC's [Human Relations Day Special Sunday](#) each year. This day of social action and raising awareness supports the Youth Offender Rehabilitation Program. Human Relations Day happens the Sunday immediately following the observance of Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday: Jan. 16 next year. To qualify for a Human Relations Day grant, the applicant must be either a UM local church, district, annual conference or other affiliated group/organization, or an ecumenical group/organization working with and through at least one UM agency or organization, whose program affects at least one UM local church. During the current quadrennium, the committee is making grants to support two specific areas of older adult ministries—caregiving ministry and intergenerational ministry. Ethnic Young Adult Summer Internship

The deadline to apply for 2011 Ethnic Young Adult (EYA) Summer Internship in Washington, D.C., is Jan. 10. The EYA program is for persons, ages 18-22, who have an interest in exploring issues of public policy, social justice advocacy and social change. Sponsored by the General Board of Church & Society (GBCS), the nine-week summer internship program is for young adults representing the five ethnic minority caucuses of the UMC: Native Americans, Pacific-Islanders, Hispanic/Latinos, African Americans and Asian Americans. Interns will work in social justice placements in the U.S. capital from May 28 to July 31. Interns will live in Christian community. Work placements will be supplemented by evening intern-led devotions, Friday seminars on topics of social justice concern, area field trips, and Sunday worship in area UM churches. Participants must commit to being present at these activities. Applicants must be in good academic standing at their college or university, demonstrate evidence of their concern for social justice through extracurricular activity, academic study and have some history of involvement in their church and/or community. "Do No Harm 2011," a UM summit addressing prevention of and response to abuse, misconduct and harassment of a sexual nature, particularly by persons in ministerial roles, will be Jan. 26-29 at First UMC Houston. This sexual ethics event will provide opportunities for conference leaders to share best practices, discuss emerging issues, and network across the denomination. Workshops will provide understanding, skill building and grounding for participants to clarify their roles and to coordinate their efforts with others as the church addresses problems of sexual abuse and misconduct. Workshops are divided into five categories, each with several sessions to choose from: Prevention, Cyber Safety, Response to Sexual Misconduct, Legal Issues, and Sexuality and Social Justice.
