[Alleged Theft at Methodist Children's Home](#)

A longtime employee at Methodist Children's Home in Waco has been arrested on charges of first degree felony for theft believed to be up to \$836,000. MCH discovered inappropriate activity through an internal audit and reported it to authorities. In a response to recent legal action and media queries, MCH President Tim Brown released the following statement: "Methodist Children's Home is aware that there has been a recent arrest of a former employee. As we previously stated, we will not comment on this personnel matter since it is prohibited by agency policy. We regret that this matter has diverted attention away from the amazing work of our dedicated and committed employees and volunteers, who give so much of themselves and their time and resources to care for 1,400 children, youth and families across Texas and New Mexico. The real news at Methodist Children's Home centers around the courage, resiliency and tenacity of our children and youth in their personal struggles to overcome traumas, tragedies and losses on their journey to health and wholeness.

"In spite of this unfortunate situation, I can assure our supporters and others that the staff and leadership of Methodist Children's Home will continue to offer hope to these children and youth and the services and programs they empower us to provide. I am confident Methodist Children's Home will emerge from this experience as a stronger organization. Methodist Children's Home is

committed to completing the internal investigation we initiated and an independent audit, and we will continue to cooperate fully with the Waco Police Department in this investigation. Since this is an ongoing investigation, we will have no further comment while this case is an open matter." (See ABC News 25 report at <http://www.kxxv.com/Global/story.asp?S=13985434>).

Bruster is doing a Sunday sermon series Feb. 6-March 6 on "Got Questions: A Thoughtful Response to Atheists" that is followed every Thursday (7 p.m. in Wesley Hall) with panel discussions on related topics — each led by a different spiritual leader.
