News Briefs — The Conference

Malaria Progress Report & Cabinet Weight Loss Pledge

Every 30 seconds... No wait! Every 45 seconds!

Progress is being made in the fight against malaria. For years, partners in the global fight against this killer disease have quoted World Health Organization figures stating that "somewhere in the world, a child under the age of five loses their life to malaria every 30 seconds." □ No more.

The World Health Organization recently revised their figures, noting that between 2006 and 2008 the number of children succumbing to malaria dropped significantly. It can now be said with confidence that "a child loses their life to malaria every 45 seconds." The good news doesn't end there. Deaths from malaria worldwide were previously estimated to be 1 million annually; figures have been revised to approximately 800,000 annual deaths. Incidences of malaria have been halved – 247 million estimated cases annually vs. the previously estimated 500 million cases across the globe.

Churches in our Central Texas Conference have pledged to help in the Imagine No Malaria cause — and the health of our Cabinet — by "investing" in the Cabinet's pledge to lose weight by the Annual Conference called session Nov. 13 at Mansfield First UMC. How are they doing? Fort Worth District Superintendent Bob Holloway reports they are down 79 pounds of the 120 pounds they pledged to lose. Will they make it? Hundreds attending the Annual Conference in June signed a Holy Covenant document promising to “heed Jesus’ call to ‘make disciples of all nations’ by extending the hand of Christian witness to at least two people each week.” The Conference Evangelism Task Force, mainly Rev. Joel Robbins (chair) and Rev. Brad Brittain, have been providing training to churches that are interested in adopting what Bishop Robert Schnase refers to as “radical hospitality.” The two pastors are committing their Thursday evenings to provide this training for local churches and/or clusters of churches anywhere in the conference. About 80% of the training includes inspirational ideas for **being invitational** (Matthew 28) and another component tied to success stories in other churches and the resulting changes in the lives of individuals and the congregation. FaithLink downloadable study resource

The Oct. 17 issue of FaithLink looks at “The New Face of Poverty.” The U.S. Census Bureau reports that the poverty rate in the U.S. rose sharply in 2009. This study resource identifies the people living in poverty and explains what churches can do to learn more about them. FaithLink is a downloadable study for use by individuals or groups of mature youths and adults who want to apply their United Methodist beliefs to current faith issues and world events. This study guide not only motivates Christians to consider their personal views on important

contemporary issues, it also encourages them to act on their beliefs.

Celebrate United Methodist Student Day

United Methodist Student Day, one of the 6 church-wide Special Sundays of the denomination, furnishes scholarships and loans for students attending UM-related and other accredited colleges and universities. **United Methodist Student Day** is celebrated the last Sunday of November. More than 9,000 students applied for UM scholarships in 2009. However, due to the lack of funds, all students were not able to receive scholarships. 90% of Student Day collections go to GBHEM's scholarship programs, while 10% is for student loans. Each UM-related colleges get money from the offering for scholarships, and each participating annual conference gets 10% of Student Day receipts to award to their own merit scholars. **Two Central Texas Conference students received scholarships in 2010. Eligibility is restricted to only those congregations that participate in the Student Day Offering. In past years, some CTC students applying for scholarships were ineligible because their churches did not participate.**

New Downloadable Domestic Violence Resource

Breaking the Silence: A Resource to Equip United Methodists to Speak Up and Speak Out About Domestic Violence.

October is Domestic Violence Month. A new, downloadable resource, "Breaking the Silence," employs the Wesleyan quadrilateral to equip local churches address systems that perpetuate domestic violence and encourage UMs to speak up and speak out about domestic violence. The 23-page study is for use in local congregations. It focuses on the need for communities of faith to address systems that perpetuate domestic violence: causing victims to remain silent and enabling perpetrators to continue. The new resource is available through the UM General Board of Church & Society (GBCS) website at <http://www.umc-gbcs.org/atf/cf/%7B689fea4c-8849-4c05-a89e-c9bc7fff64c%7D/BREAKINGSILENCE.PDF>.

This resource provides an opportunity for church members, either as individuals or in small groups, to study domestic violence through the lens of the Wesleyan quadrilateral of scripture, tradition, reason and experience. It uses Psalm 139 as its biblical text. Author of the resource is Meredith Hoxie, a theology student at Boston School of Theology. Hoxie worked as a social justice intern with GBCS this summer. "This resource is to help clergy and laity understand the complexities of these violent relationships," Hoxie said, "to examine their theological understanding of this violence, to challenge the way leaders of The United Methodist Church teach and preach troubling texts of violence, and to know how to advocate for victims of such violence in their churches and in the world."

Sexual Ethics Summit — Jan. 26-29

"Do No Harm 2011," a UM summit addressing prevention of and response to abuse, misconduct and harassment of a sexual nature, particularly by persons in ministerial roles, will be Jan. 26-29 at First UMC Houston. This sexual ethics event will provide opportunities for conference leaders to share best practices, discuss emerging issues, and network across the denomination. Workshops will provide understanding, skill building and grounding for participants to clarify their roles and to coordinate their efforts with others as the church addresses problems of sexual abuse and misconduct. Workshops are divided into five categories, each with several sessions to choose from: Prevention, Cyber Safety, Response to Sexual Misconduct, Legal Issues, and Sexuality and Social Justice. "Do No Harm" is for annual conference response teams, and others who coordinate ministries related to sexual ethics and boundaries in ministerial relationships. At least two persons from each annual conference are expected to attend. Conference leaders endeavoring to start or invigorate a Response Team or Safe Sanctuaries Team are especially encouraged to attend. The event can accommodate 250 registered attendees.
